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Important News From The . . . PERKIOMEN TOWNSHIP MUNICIPAL AUTHORITY

Infiltration is groundwater and or rain water that enters the sanitary sewer collection system through defects in the system. These defects include cracked or broken pipes, deteriorated manholes, faulty laterals or lateral connections, etc.

Inflow is groundwater or rain water that enters the sanitary sewer collection system through direct connections to the system. These connections include floor or foundation drains, sump pumps, rain leaders, low lying vents for laterals, faulty manhole covers and frames, etc.

Perkiomen Township Municipal Authority has a Representative Metering Agreement with the **LPVRSA**. Under this agreement, LPVRSA installed two meters in the connections that the PTMA has in the Perkiomen Interceptor. The purpose of these



meters is to determine the amount of infiltration/inflow the PTMA Sewer System is sending to the Oaks Wastewater Treatment Plant through the Perkiomen Interceptor. Infiltration/inflow is a major issue for both the sewer system and a treatment plant; therefore; PTMA must deal with this issue or face financial penalties under the Representative Metering Agreement.

The PTMA has annually been putting money into the maintenance of the sewer collection system that is over 36 miles of sanitary sewer main as well as over 800 sanitary sewer manholes. In an effort to identify and reduce the infiltration/inflow and thus minimize any increase in the sewer user charges, the repairs to the system have been insignificant in comparison to the amount of infiltration/inflow still being experienced. The result is the need to increase the amount of money the PTMA is putting into maintaining and operating the sewer collection system or face the financial penalties under the Representative Metering Agreement.

The control of infiltration/inflow is not limited to the sanitary sewer collection system owned by the PTMA. Infiltration/inflow can be coming from individual properties in the form of floor drains, sump pumps, rain leaders, low lying sewer vents, etc. **These should not be connected to the sanitary sewer system** as they could be adding to the infiltration/inflow problem. If you have any of these connections on your property they must be disconnected immediately. Hopefully by working together, any future increases in the sewer user charges can be kept at a minimum.

NO BURNING REGULATIONS

On August 3, 2010, the Perkiomen Township Board of Supervisors enacted Ordinance No. 207, an amended Recycling Ordinance. The amended Recycling Ordinance was a requirement of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Resources. One of the significant changes was the ban on burning. The Recycling Ordinance states that "No resident or person shall burn any recyclable material, leaf waste or municipal waste." STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

STORMWATER BASIC INFORMATION

Stormwater Program

OVERVIEW

Stormwater runoff is generated when precipitation from rain and snowmelt events flows over land or impervious surfaces and does not percolate into the ground. As the runoff flows over the land or impervious surfaces (paved streets, parking lots, and building rooftops), it accumulates debris, chemicals, sediment or other pollutants that could adversely affect water quality if the runoff is discharged untreated. The primary method to control stormwater discharges is the use of best management practices (BMPs). In addition, most stormwater discharges are considered point sources and require coverage under an NPDES permit. SMALL MUNICIPAL SEPARATE STORM SEWER SYSTEMS (MS4)

Federal regulations that were issued by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) established permit requirements within the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) for discharge to surface water from certain MS4s. The intent of these regulations is the improve water quality of the waterways in the United States. The permit requirement applies to small MS4s that have been designated by Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PEDEP). Perkiomen Township has been designated by the PADEP as one of these small MS4s. Perkiomen Township's NPDES Permit Number is 130069. 
INFORMATION FOR HOMEOWNERS, RESIDENTS AND BUSINESSES

WHAT YOU CAN DO TO HELP

As stormwater flows over driveways, lawns, and sidewalks, it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. Stormwater can flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river, wetland, or coastal water. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water. Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water. By practicing healthy household habits, homeowners can keep common pollutants like pesticides, pet waste, grass clippings, and automotive fluids off the ground and out of stormwater. Adopt these healthy household habits and help protect lakes, streams, rivers, wetlands, and coastal waters. Remember to share the habits with your neighbors!

HOME REPAIR AND IMPROVEMENT

- **Before beginning an outdoor project**, locate the nearest storm drains and protect them from debris and other materials.
- **Sweep up and properly dispose** of construction debris such as concrete and mortar.
- Use hazardous substances like paints, solvents, and cleaners in the smallest amounts possible, and follow the directions on the label. Clean up spills immediately, and dispose of the waste safely. Store substances properly to avoid leaks and spills.
- Purchase and use nontoxic, biodegradable, recycled, and recyclable products whenever possible.
- **Clean paint brushes in a sink, not outdoors.** Filter and reuse paint thinner when using oil-based paints. Properly dispose of excess paints through a household hazardous waste collection program, or donate unused paint to local organizations.
- Reduce the amount of paved area and increase the amount of vegetated area in your yard. Use native plants in your landscaping to reduce the need for watering during dry periods. Consider directing downspouts away from paved surfaces onto lawns and other measures to increase infiltration and reduce polluted runoff.





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STORMWATER MANAGEMENT continued

PET CARE

When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Flushing pet waste is the best disposal method. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into local waterbodies.

SEPTIC SYSTEM USE AND MAINTENANCE



- **Have your septic system inspected** by a professional at least every 3 years, and have the septic tank pumped as necessary (usually every 3 to 5 years).
- **Care for the septic system drainfield** by not driving or parking vehicles on it. Plant only grass over and near the drainfield to avoid damage from roots.
- **Flush responsibly.** Flushing household chemicals like paint, pesticides, oil, and antifreeze can destroy the biological treatment taking place in the system. Other items, such as diapers, paper towels, and cat litter, can clog the septic system and potentially damage components.

INFORMATION FOR BUSINESS STORMWATER DISCHARGES FROM COMMERCIAL PROPERTIES

VEHICLE, BUSES, AUTOMOBILE FACILITIES AND GARAGE

- Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a lawn or other unpaved surface to minimize the amount of dirty, soapy water flowing into the storm drain and eventually into your local waterbody.
- **Clean up spilled fluids immediately** and properly dispose of clean up/absorbent material. Do not rinse the spills into a nearby storm drain. Remember to properly dispose of the absorbent material.
- Recycle used oil and other automotive fluids at participating service stations. Don't
 dump these chemicals down the storm drain or dispose of them in your trash.
- **Properly maintain fleet vehicles** to prevent oil, gas, and other discharges from being washed into the storm drain.
- **Dirt, oil, and debris** that collect in parking lots and paved areas can be washed into the storm sewer system.
- **Sweep up litter and debris** from sidewalks, driveways and parking lots, especially around storm drains.
- Cover grease storage and dumpsters and keep them clean to avoid leaks.

PERKIOMEN TOWNSHIP MUNICIPAL AUTHORITY CAUSES OF SEWER BACK-UPS

The Perkiomen Township Municipal Authority spent time televising the sanitary sewer mains in certain areas of the Township in 2015. While completing this televising, the Township/Municipal Authority found grease build-up and tree roots in some of the sewer laterals. The Municipal Authority has the responsibility for the maintenance of the sanitary sewer mains. The responsibility to maintain the sewer laterals from the home or building to the sewer main belongs to the property owner.

One of the main causes of sewer blockages is grease in the sewer laterals and sewer mains. Do not pour grease down your sink. As the grease cools it attaches itself to the walls of the sewer laterals. As time goes on and more grease is poured down the sink, the grease will continue to build-up until you could be faced with a blockage in your sewer lateral or in the sewer main. Using hot

water to wash the grease down the drain only causes the grease to build up farther into the sewer lateral or into the sewer main. Grease should be collected in a metal container and allowed to cool and solidify prior to throwing away in the normal trash. The photograph on the left is of a lateral that is beginning to have a grease build up that could eventually lead to a blockage in the homeowners lateral.

Root intrusion causes slow drainage and can eventually lead to a blockage in the sewer lateral. Sewer laterals are usually made up of either vitrified clay, cast iron, or PVC pipe. Roots will generally grow into pipes where there is already a defect in the pipe. Over time, the tree roots can push their way into any cracks or the joints in

the pipe. As the tree or shrubs grow, so do their roots. As the roots grow, they can move toward a source of water which can be your sewer lateral. When considering where to plant trees or shrubs try to plant them away from you sewer laterals. The further the distance of the tree or shrub, the better chance that you may not encounter this problem. The following are examples of root intrusion in homeowner laterals.

Also, please keep in mind that objects such as toys, paper towels, disposable diapers, baby wipes, and cleaning wipes can also become clogged in your sewer lateral. Please do not flush these items down your toilet as they can become trapped in your lateral and, over time create a buildup that will clog the lateral resulting in a sewer back-up.

DROP OFF GUIDELINES

- NO TV's, electronics, or appliances will be accepted
- Event workers will unload your materials so please remain in your vehicle with your windows up.
- BUSINESSES AND CONTRACTORS WILL BE TURNED AWAY, commercial/industrial generated hazardous waste will not be accepted.
- · Bring all substances in original containers with labels. Itemsmust be identifiable. Do not mix materials.
- Gas containers returned upon request.
- Tighten lids on all containers. If containers are leaking, pack in larger container with newspaper to soak up leaks.
- Maximum amount accepted is 25 gallons or 220 pounds. A five-gallon bucket is the largest acceptable container.
- Event workers will unload your materials so please remain in your vehicle.
- There are no permanent drop off locations in the region for household hazardous waste, only the listed collections.

MANAGING SPRING/SUMMER STORMWATER

Tips For Reducing Stormwater Pollution On Your Property This Spring/Summer

1) Plant native trees, shrubs and perennials! Native plants have deep root systems which help them to absorb more rain water than non-natives. They also require less maintenance than non-native plants.










- 2) Install a rain barrel. Rain barrels capture water from your roof before it can become polluted storm water runoff. It is also a great source of free water that can be used to water plants or top off 01 swimming pool.
- **Reduce chemical use and never use before it rains.** Fertilizers and weed killers can be washed off your property and into nearby waterways when it rains.
- **4) Consider alternatives to traditional pavement.** There are many convenient previous pavement options that reduce stormwater runoff.



SUMMER WATER CONSERVATION

Eco-friendly tips for managing your property this summer

- 1) Wash your car at a car wash. Most car washes reuse the wash water before sending it to a treatment plant. If you want to wash your car at home, wash it on gravel or grass.
- **2) Start composting.** Pre-made compost tumblers are a great option for a small yard. Not only does composting reduce waste, but adding compost to your soil helps with stormwater infiltration.
- **3) Only rain should go down storm drains.** Make sure not to blow grass clippings into storm drains, and if hosing off your driveway or car, try to send the runoff into a vegetated area.
- **4) Set sprinklers to minimize runoff.** Make sure sprinkler heads are adjusted to reduce overspray and only water the minimum amount necessary for the plant.

SWIMMING POOL GUIDELINES

The discharge of any sewage of industrial waste, including swimming pool water to a water of Commonwealth without a permit is a violation of the Clean Streams Law, the Act of June 22, 1937 P.L. 1987, as amended.


It has been the Department's policy not to require permits for discharges from single residence pools provided the guidelines outlined below are followed. Local municipalities should be contacted concerning local ordinances.

These guidelines shall not be construed so as to waive or impair any rights of the Department of Environmental Protection to prosecute the property (pool) owner and/or pool company for any stream damage that occurs as a result of the discharge. Penalties would be assessed under the provisions of the Clean Streams Law.

POOL GUIDELINES:


A. Disposal of Water To Sanitary Sewer

If the municipal authority grants permission, discharging of pool backwash water, neutralized pool cleaning wastewater and standing water to the sanitary sewer system is the best environmental alternative. Care should be taken in making sure the discharge is to a sanitary sewer and NOT a storm sewer which would discharge to a stream. If sanitary sewers are not in the immediate area, the water should be hauled off-site for disposal at an approved treatment facility.



The following guidelines must be followed if water is not pumped or hauled to a sanitary sewer. Water should be pumped over a grassy area to allow absorption, filtration and aeration of

over a grassy area to allow absorption, filtration and aeration of water. The discharge should be at a rate which prevents erosion and optimizes infiltration. In no event shall pool waters be directly discharged to waters of the Commonwealth.



Cleaning wastewaters containing muriatic acid or chlorine that is used in cleaning pool surfaces needs to be treated prior to discharge. Muriatic acid wastewater should be neutralized to pH between 6 and 9 standard units. Chlorine rinses should stand for a period of days to allow chlorine degradation prior to discharge. Total chlorine residual of the wastewater discharge should be less than 0.5mg/l. Temperature should be monitored as above (standing water), Chlorine rinse water pH should be between 6 and 9 standard units.

Filter backwash water during normal pool operation must be at a sufficiently low volume that all water infiltrates to the ground. Backwash water discharged to a stream or storm sewer is not permitted.


