The EAC was busy in 2024! Here are just a few of our activities and projects!

- Hosted a Rain Garden Workshop and a Rain Barrel Workshop by Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy
- Became a Bird Town
- Met a lot of great residents at our Community Day table
- Hosted a presentation about native birds, plants, and pollinators
- Started collaborating with local organizations like PV Woods

## LEAF WASTE & SMALL BRANCH DROP-OFF

Residents of Perkiomen Township may drop-off leaf waste (which does not include grass clippings, yard waste, stumps, or roots) but would include leaves, shrubbery and tree trimmings at the Township building on MONDAYS and FRIDAYS ONLY from 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

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#### What Is It?

Microsurfacing is a design mixture of polymer-modified emulsified asphalt, mineral aggregate, mineral filler, water, and other additives proportioned, mixed, and uniformly spread over a properly prepared surface. It is used as a pavement preservation and maintenance treatment to improve the functional characteristics of the pavement surface and extend its service life.



**Perkiomen Township** uses **Microsurfacing** as a preventative maintenance tool on roads that are in generally good condition, so they do not deteriorate to a state that requires an expensive rehabilitation method. Example projects in the past 5 years include: Belgian Rd, Equestrian Ln, Stallion Ln, Cranberry Blvd., Elizabeth Ct, King Rd, Northridge Rd, Queen Rd, and Stewart Rd.



This photo shows a roadway divided by two counties. Both sides of the road were overlaid on the same day. One county performed microsurfacing, after the initial overlay installation in order to maintain and extend the life of the roadway and one county did not. The difference between the two surfaces years later is dramatic!

#### How is it installed?


The Microsurfacing mixture is made by a specialized machine and placed on a continuous basis by mixing the materials simultaneously in a pug mill. The figure to the right shows the process in the microsurfacing machine, which results in a free-flowing composite material spread on the underlying pavement using a spreader box. The mixture's consistency permits even spreading over the pavement, forming an adhesive bond to the pavement.

#### Pros

- Cost is approximately 1/3 the cost of a traditional resurfacing method.
- Adds 7-8 years or more to pavement life when applied to a road in appropriate condition.
- Reduces life-cycle cost 25-45% and raw material by 35% or more compared to traditional resurfacing methods.
- Reduces greenhouse gases by 44% and energy use by 54% or more compared to traditional resurfacing methods.
- Easy to install and no milling or utility adjustments are necessary.
- Return to traffic within two-four hours.
- PennDOT & FHA Approved Material.

#### Cons

- Following installation the road may not feel as smooth as traditional asphalt overlay; however, as traffic drives over it and the sun heats the pavement the material will smooth out.
- Following installation of the new surface small stones will come loose from the surface for the first several weeks or months.
- The initial appearance will not be as uniform or pleasing as a conventional overlay; over time the appearance will improve.

## FIREWORKS ORDINANCE



On October 8, 2023, Perkiomen Township Ordinance No. 242 regulating the Use of Display & Consumer Fireworks within Perkiomen Township took effect. Pennsylvania Act 74 of 2022 was adopted by the General Assembly on July 6, 2022, and was signed by Governor Shapiro on July 11, 2022. That Act amended Title 3 Pa. C. S. Chapter 11 ("Fireworks Law") and became effective on September 9, 2022. The Fireworks Law authorizes the adoption of rules and regulations by municipalities. The Perkiomen Township Board of Supervisors determined that the full authority provided by the Fireworks Law should be exercised in the interests of public safety and decided to regulate the use of Display and Consumer Fireworks within the limits as set forth withing Act 74. Where and/or when required, residents of Perkiomen Township must obtain permits for such use.

To apply for a permit for Fireworks, either Consumer or Display, a Fire Permit application can be found on the Perkiomen Township website. Applications shall be submitted to Perkiomen Township a minimum of two (2) weeks prior to the use of Consumer Fireworks and a minimum of three (3) weeks prior to the use of Display Fireworks. Prior to the issuance of a Fire Permit for Fireworks use, Perkiomen Township will gather information from the applicant to ensure that compliance with Act 74 of 2022 and Ordinance 242 will be complied with.

Failure to obtain a permit may result in enforcement proceedings against a property owner and/or the person(s) responsible for the use of the fireworks. The use of Consumer Fireworks in violation of the Fireworks Law and Township Ordinance is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00 for the first offense and \$1,000.00 for a second offense within three (3) years of the first offense. The use of Display Fireworks in violation of the Fireworks Law is punishable by a fine of not less than \$10,000.00. Perkiomen Township does have the right to give verbal or written warnings at the staff's discretion.

Any questions regarding this Ordinance or Permits should be directed to Perkiomen Township Fire Marshal, John Moran, Jr., at 610-489-4034, extension 120. Those who wish to file a complaint regarding the use of fireworks are required to do so in writing on the Township's Citizen Complaint Form and submit the complaint to Perkiomen Township within five (5) days of the alleged violation.

## **DROP OFF GUIDELINES**

- · Leave items at home that are not for the event so that they are not removed accidentally.
- · If you need your gas can or container returned, please tape a note to it stating that you want to keep it.
- You may arrive any time within your registered appointment window.
- Please print out your ticket or write your name and appointment time on a piece of paper, and place it on your dashboard where it is visible to event staff.
- If you cannot attend the event, please cancel your appointment through your Eventbrite ticket or by emailing Recycling@MontgomeryCountyPA.gov, as others may be waiting for an opening.
- · NO TVs, electronics, or appliances will be accepted.
- Event workers will unload your materials so please remain in your vehicle.
- · BUSINESSES AND CONTRACTORS WILL BE TURNED AWAY, no commercial/industrial waste accepted.
- · Bring all substances in original containers with labels. Items must be identifiable. Do not mix materials.
- · Tighten lids on all containers. If containers are leaking, pack in larger container with newspaper to soak up leaks.
- NO 25- OR 50-GALLON DRUMS ALLOWED. Five-gallon buckets are the largest acceptable container. Maximum amount accepted per vehicle is 25 gallons or 220 pounds.
- · There are no permanent drop off locations in the region for household hazardous waste, only the listed collections.

## SWIMMING POOL GUIDELINES

PENNSYLVANIA DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION SOUTHEAST REGIONAL OFFICE 2 EAST MAIN STREET NORRISTOWN, PA 19401

The discharge of any sewage of industrial waste, including swimming pool water to a water of Commonwealth without a permit is a violation of the Clean Streams Law, the Act of June 22, 1937 P.L. 1987, as amended.

It has been the Department's policy not to require permits for discharges from single residence pools provided the guidelines outlined below are followed. Local municipalities should be contacted concerning local ordinances.

These guidelines shall not be construed so as to waive or impair any rights of the Department of Environmental Protection to prosecute the property (pool) owner and/or pool company for any stream damage that occurs as a result of the discharge. Penalties would be assessed under the provisions of the Clean Streams Law.

#### POOL GUIDELINES:

#### A. Disposal of Water To Sanitary Sewer

If the municipal authority grants permission, discharging of pool backwash water, neutralized pool cleaning wastewater and standing water to the sanitary sewer system is the best environmental alternative. Care should be taken in making sure the discharge is to a sanitary sewer and NOTa storm sewer which would discharge to a stream. If sanitary sewers are not in the immediate area, the water should be hauled off-site for disposal at an approved treatment facility.

#### B. Discharge of Water

The following guidelines must be followed if water is not pumped or hauled to a sanitary sewer. Water should be pumped over a grassy area to allow absorption, filtration and aeration of water. The discharge should be at a rate which prevents erosion and optimizes infiltration. In no event shall pool waters be directly discharged to waters of the Commonwealth.

Standing water or accumulated rain and/or pool water from the previous season should be pumped from the top so as not to disturb settled solids. Solids on the pool bottom should not be discharged. Following pump down of water, solids should be cleaned out manually. The discharge should not raise instream temperatures by more than 2 degrees F in a one hour period or a total of 5 degrees F, pH should be between 6 and 9 standard units and total chlorine residual should be 0.0mg/l.

#### SWIMMING POOL GUIDELINES

Cleaning wastewaters containing muriatic acid or chlorine that is used in cleaning pool surfaces needs to be treated prior to discharge. Muriatic acid wastewater should be neutralized to pH between 6 and 9 standard units. Chlorine rinses should stand for a period of days to allow chlorine degradation prior to discharge. Total chlorine residual of the wastewater discharge should be less than 0.5mg/l. Temperature should be monitored as above (standing water), Chlorine rinse water pH should be between 6 and 9 standard units.

Filter backwash water during normal pool operation must be at a sufficiently low volume that all water infiltrates to the ground. Backwash water discharged to a stream or storm sewer is not permitted.

## SWIMMING POOL PERMITS



As summer is rapidly approaching and temperatures and humidity start to soar, people are looking for ways to keep cool. One way people are dealing with the heat is the purchase of these relatively inexpensive portable/storable on-ground pools that are seen on this page. These pools can be purchased at almost every big box retail store around.

The Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code (UCC) and International Swimming Pool and Spa Code (ISPSC) define a Swimming Pool as a pool intended for use, which is accessory to a residential setting, and available to the household and its guests. This includes in-ground, above-ground, and on-ground swimming pools.

Although they are storable and can be taken down at the end of the season, these pools are regulated by the UCC, and enforced by Perkiomen Township. A one-time building permit is required and compliance with the ISPSC shall always be maintained while the pool has water in it and upon a property in Perkiomen Township. Although a permit will not be required every season for the pool, the barrier shall still meet the adopted code requirements. These Barrier Requirements are intended to provide protection against potential drowning's and near-drowning's by restricting access to the swimming pools.

Property owners who fail to obtain a permit for these pools may face a fine of up to \$1000.00.

All residents of the Township are invited to attend this event. It is a great time to meet your neighbors and other residents of the Township. No pets are allowed.





Whiler ain showers are important for the environment, they also have the ability to lead to harmful stormwater pollution. Belowa re some tips forp reventing pollution this spring:


- Only rain belongs in the drain! As you're cleaning up your yard this spring, remember that storm drains are not garbage disposals. Never dump anything, including leaves and grass clippings, into a storm drain.
- Usel awnc hemicals sparingly. Always follow thea pplication instructions
  andn ever use before it rains. Switch to organic fertilizers wherep ossible or
  mulch leaves and grass clippings into your yard to add nutrients back into
  your soil.
- Replace turf grass with natives! Lawns have little to no environmental
  benefits andt urf grass requires lots of maintenance to stay green. Swap
  your lawn for native perennials by adding more garden spacei n your yard!
  Not only do natives require less maintenance than turf grass, they are vital
  for theh ealth of our environment and thes urvivalo f pollinators, birds and
  other wildlife.

- Plant for pollinators. Plant with a variety of native species that flower throughout the year to provide pollinators with vital food sources.

  paths, keeping dogs on leash and taking litter home.
- Provide food and water for wildlife. Early in the season, food may be scarce and water sources can still be frozen. Make sure replenish and clean feeders and bird baths regularly.
- Plant trees and shrubs. Trees and shrubs have immense benefits for wildlife! Leaves, flowers, bark and branches provide vital resources for a wide variety of species.

# **Protecting our Streams and Creeks**

Summer has arrived, ushering in longer days and warmer temperatures! Many of us prefer to beat the heat by engaging in activities in and around the water. Whether you enjoy swimming, kayaking, fishing, or simply appreciating the beauty of nature, clean water is essential for recreation and enjoyment. Here are some ways you can help maintain the cleanliness of our waterways this summer:

- Minimize or eliminate the use of fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides. These lawn chemicals are significant contributors to nitrogen and phosphorus pollution, leading to toxic runoff.
- Opt for native plants in your landscaping. Using native vegetation helps reduce stormwater runoff and requires less watering and fertilization compared to non-native species.
- Install a rain barrel. Positioned at the base of a downspout, a standard rain barrel can capture 55-75 gallons of stormwater runoff from your rooftop, helping to mitigate flooding and erosion.

# Supporting Wildlife this Summer

Summer offers a wonderful opportunity to engage with nature and appreciate the beauty of local wildlife. However, as caretakers of our environment, it's important to take measures to ensure the safety and wellbeing of the wildlife who call our area home.

- Dispose of trash responsibly. Outdoor activities and picnics tend to produce litter, which can pose risks to wildlife if not handled appropriately.
   Always take your trash with you or utilize designated trash bins.
- Look before you mow. Rabbits often create nests in shallow areas of yards, so inspecting for nests prior to mowing can prevent accidental harm to baby rabbits. Turtles are also frequently run over by mowers. Taking a brief stroll around your yard before mowing can help avoid any mishaps.
- Be aware of water sources. Water is vital for wildlife, particularly during the hot summer months. Ensure bird baths and other water sources are clean and accessible, and refrain from using chemicals or pesticides nearby.







# Free Registration Renewal for Veterans

Applies to military veterans who meet the following requirements (license plate fees still apply):

- Purple Heart recipients
- Veterans who lost a limb or eye or who became partially paralyzed while in the service
- Prisoners of war

Great news! The annual income-eligibility threshold for a retired Pennsylvanian to qualify for a reduced vehicle registration fee has been increased, allowing more people to be eligible for this benefit. Additionally, some veterans may now be eligible for free vehicle registration and titling fees.

If your annual income is \$29,906, you are retired, and you are receiving Social Security or other pension payments - you can qualify for the current \$11 reduced rate registration fee.

Eligible veterans are also now exempt from vehicle registration and titling fees. Exemption includes one passenger vehicle or truck owned by military veterans who meet the following requirements:

- A person who has been awarded the Purple Heart.
- · A veteran who lost a limb or eye or who became partially paralyzed while serving in the Armed Forces.
- A person who, as a member or the Armed Forces, was captured by the enemy in any armed conflict.
- A person who has been awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.
